Sailor on the Rocks!

Sybren Oggel shares how the Limerick SCFS team were able to minister to a sailor in need.

The Petra sailed into Foynes last November where the Limerick SCFS team met the crew. We learnt that the ship's cook, Noel Silva, was very ill and had been evacuated to the UL Limerick Hospital. Petra, meaning 'rock', is the name of the ship. Amazingly Noel met with SCFS volunteers as well as Filipino Christians whilst in hospital, and would later put his trust in Jesus, the Rock of our salvation.

As the local SCFS team, we were able to co-ordinate with the ship's agent to find out where he had been admitted and what his immediate needs were, and from there to support him with regular visits, prayer

as well as immediate needs such as clothing.

Noel faced a very difficult five weeks in the hospital, with intense pain keeping him awake at night. The first few nights were spent on a trolley in A&E before he was moved elsewhere and further testing was done and eventually was diagnosed with severe lymphoma. It was decided to administer the first round of



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chemotherapy when in Limerick and when he had sufficiently recovered from this he was allowed to travel back to the Philippines.

Though Noel went through a very difficult time in his life, made more so by not having his family with him, it was also a good opportunity for SCFS and other Christians in Limerick to be able to show him Christian love and support. A WhatsApp group was set up to co-ordinate efforts, initially to provide him with basic needs such as a phone-charger, pyjamas, other clothing and toiletries. As the news spread, he was visited by many people both from hospital staff and outside to talk and pray with him. Some of the Filipino staff brought him Filipino food and churches in Limerick regularly prayed for him. It was wonderful to learn that through these conversations Noel had accepted Jesus into his life and put his trust in Him.

In mid-December Noel was able to travel back to his home city in the Philippines where he was able to spend Christmas with his family and continue with the chemotherapy treatment there. Before leaving Noel said, "Thank you to each and everyone for the support, love and prayers extended to me."


The episode has also helped to strengthen SCFS's relationship with the local shipping agent representing the *Petra*, as we were able to partner with them in supporting Noel during his stay in Limerick.

Latest news is that Noel has completed the third of six rounds of chemo treatment. He expresses his intense gratitude to everyone who supported and prayed for him during his time in Limerick. Please pray that Noel's health will continue to improve and that his faith in the Lord will continue to grow.

A bottle ship, Cebuano Bible, two cuddly toys, knitted hats and scarves, plus three suitcases and a few bags were very gratefully received! Finally, we prayed with them. How delighted and grateful they were, and so were wel

On another visit, I was warmly welcomed by 90 crew members – mainly from England and the Philippines, including two doctors. I was able to give a bottle ship to the Polish captain. Of course, I had to have a bite to eat with the Filipinos, and at the same time was able to share valuable spiritual food.

On board I was called *'Uncle Theo'* by the crew. The Chief

Cook said: "Uncle Theo, if you come again, please let me know in advance, because then I will prepare a special meal".

At the car we provided suitcases, a winter coat that was immediately put on with gratitude, knitted hats and scarves, socks, a travel bag and some wooden crosses, and cuddly toys. All were gratefully received. We prayed with them before we left.

We arranged to visit again and were warmly greeted at the gangway. The Filipino Chief Cook, Elejedo, immediately gave us a fantastic meal (carefully packed) to take home. They listened attentively as Yvonne shared how God had healed and helped her. Sailor Bibles, ORcode Keychain Bibles, a pair of long socks, a cuddly toy, and two suitcases were gratefully received. The word of God never returns empty, and the cook spontaneously started singing a beautiful worship song. We prayed together and departed saying, "Until we meet again!"

Call to Me, and I will answer you, and show you great and mighty things, which you do not know. Jeremiah 33:3

lain writes about his early days as Port Chaplain in Aberdeen...

When I arrived in Aberdeen the vendors of the house had not moved out, and we did not have access until late afternoon. I sat down that evening with a cup of tea and wondered where all the boxes were going to go and how we were going to unpack and store our belongings.

Three weeks later I was in the office of the port SHEQ officer being ushered through my port induction. I was introduced to the harbour master and one of the dock control officers and shown how to use the port website for information. I was driven around the port, introduced to some pilots, the linesmen, and some of the security personnel, often from the depths of the car. I could hear their voice but see no face. At the end of the day, I was wondering where do I go from here? It was as if an audible voice was saying "Leave it to me, I am in charge".

Driving into the north port the following week, happy to finally be on the road to ship visitation, I could see enormous vessels that engendered a sense of trepidation – supply vessels and standby vessels are big! But all the worry vanished as the car was parked on Regent Quay and I approached the first

vessel. An invitation to come on board was issued from the top of the gangplank. Upon reaching the top of the gangplank the ship's visitor book appeared and I was signed in and I was taken up several flights of steps to see the Captain who engaged me in a general conversation.

On the next vessel, the Captain was from Ukraine and the first officer was from Romania. They were happy that I had visited and first added to my limited Romanian vocabulary in return for teaching them an English phrase. As I descended the gangplank, I met a Filipino AB disposing of some rubbish – he was delighted to hear some words in Tagalog, "magandang umaga, kamustaka". He engaged in conversation and accepted a Gospel of John. Imagine my surprise when he told me his name was

When I visited the south port for the first time, there was a Maersk vessel in for a name change. Maersk have sold their vessels to Duff and all the vessels are now named Skandi...

This time the number of steps to the bridge was far greater and I had to catch my breath upon arriving at the bridge. The Captain was from the Faroe Islands. We had a brief general conversation, but he was delighted to accept the offer of twenty-five new woolly hats for his crew. I visited this vessel a few weeks later with a new Captain and upon the offer of Christmas gifts his words were, "We







would be delighted to accept because it shows that someone cares."

Since that first day prayers have been answered. I have met crews and their back-to-back replacement crews. I have ministered in mess rooms, engine rooms, crew sheds down on deck, smoke rooms and on the bridge. Seafarers are from the four corners of the globe and vessels are large and small. Supply vessels and standby vessels make up the greater number of ships in port but there are many other types of vessels: container ships, diving support vessels, huge vessels with helipads, coasters, fisheries inspection vessels, a ferry, bulk carriers.

The weather has been varied. We were not here that long before there was an extended period of snow and ice. But in all things God is to be praised, often at the end of the day I would wonder what next and something would happen to demonstrate that the work in Aberdeen is not my work, but God's work. One morning an email winged its way to my phone, an invite to a monthly pastor's prayer time. These prayer times are like an oasis amid a busy chaplaincy. One day I returned to my car to write up my log and the phone pinged with an email. The message was from a lady who said the CEO of Aberdeen port has instructed me to set up a meeting, he would like to meet you.

On several occasions seafarers after hearing the Bible read to them have said, "Thank you for reading God's word to us" or "It is good to hear God's word read". Only last week a seafarer listened as Psalm 119:41-56 was read. The result? A discussion about personal Bible reading and prayer and a question: "When we arrive back in port will you take me to church?"

There are many other things I could share, one chef likes to challenge me to taste test sweets! In one of the mess rooms, four Filipinos listened attentively as I shared from Psalm 107 and Matthew 8:23-27. I heard several *Amens* and a *Hallelujah*. They invited me to share food with them. Then the Filipino galley steward appeared and engaged me in conversation. She was enthralled that as a missionary/chaplain I visit ships and engage seafarers on board vessels. She thanked me for coming and wants me to return.

Two upcoming events I would appreciate prayer for are an invitation to participate in the commissioning and dedication of a memorial stone to the trawlermen of Aberdeen on the 29th of March, something Sam Cowan has graciously given some pointers on. In May, the tall ships arrive in Aberdeen and the chaplaincies in Aberdeen have been asked to set up a stall sharing about the work of the chaplains.

We are excited by the developing work of SCFS in Scotland and are keen to expand our Scottish support network. Iain and Mike would love to share about SCFS with your churches and schools.

seafarers in the study of God's Word. The Romanian captain, Dutch, Russian and Filipino crew thanked me for encouraging them with God's Word and prayers. Nine Bibles were taken. Please pray God's Word will be real to them when they read it.

On a container ship I met three Filipino crew and shared God's word. The cook was especially moved. She confided in me that her husband died fourteen years ago, and she has been working hard to support her family of five children. She asked me to pray for her twenty-year-old son who is looking for a job on board the ship where she is working and for her eighteen-vear-old daughter who will have exams in February for college entrance. She has a lot of burdens to support her children financially as they study at school. She was encouraged as we prayed together for her family situations.

A Window into a Hidden World

Richard, a retired secondary school Religious Education teacher and a Church of England minister, has served as a Reader (Licensed Lay Minister) for thirty seven years, and more recently as an ordained priest.

As part of my second year of curacy, I needed a one-month placement in another church or chaplaincy. Just before Christmas 2024, I contacted Peter Wells, SCFS Port Chaplain, to explore the possibility of joining the Portsmouth Team. Peter, unfamiliar with this type of request, kindly investigated, and soon we met in person with Ship Visitor, Hermie Santos. We shared our testimonies and discussed the spiritual and practical aspects of ship visiting. Before long, I received application forms, with the wonderfully inventive title 'Ad Hoc Volunteer' – or as I like to think of it, 'Needed Volunteer.'

SCFS provides excellent online training, with accessible text and video content designed for those unfamiliar with the life of seafarers. I took extra time to make notes and reflect, but nothing compares to first-hand experience. This 'Needed Volunteer' quickly realized how much I depended on the wisdom and guidance of Peter and the Portsmouth team. Their faith, encouragement, and generosity are truly inspiring.

The training highlighted how seafarers often face loneliness and isolation, spending months at sea with limited communication and shore leave. But it wasn't until my first ship visit that this became a reality. As Peter and I entered the mess, twelve smiling crew members greeted us, eager for conversation. We shared the good news of Jesus, offering seafarers

Bibles, books, and woolly hats. Soon, a barge arrived from the Isle of Wight, and the men rushed off to bring aboard a wind turbine blade. The ship's master returned later to apologize and express his gratitude:

"We are pretty isolated, and it's good to know people care about us sea people. We can feel forgotten."

God's guiding hand has been evident throughout my placement. Aboard the MS Borealis, Brian, Angela, and I experienced a series of divine appointments. We were directed to connect with a seafarer who SCFS can support in his ministry, providing Christian fellowship among the crew. Later, in the freezing February air, we met JR, mopping the deck. He was delighted to receive a warm knitted hat and spoke about his family in the Philippines. When asked if he was a Christian, he responded, "Yes, born again." He explained that while the chaplain led Sunday worship, there was no regular fellowship. We prayed for JR and his family, also asking God to provide other believers with whom he could meet. Soon after we met Joshua who is also born again. We encouraged him, saying, "Do you know JR? He's looking for someone to pray with!" What a joy to see God at work.

I wholeheartedly recommend placements with SCFS as it truly opens a window into a hidden world. My prayers for seafarers will now be deeply personal. A huge thank you to Peter, Tony, Brian, Angela, Hermie, and Sharon for making me feel so welcome.

To those considering this ministry – step aboard. You'll be blessed beyond measure!









Sam Cowan's 25th Anniversary


It's always nice to celebrate significant staff anniversaries, and on the 6th of November SCFS family and friends gathered together to mark Sam Cowan's 25 years with SCFS. Our thanks go to Joanne Bunting, MLA, who hosted the event in Stormont Parliament buildings in Belfast.

Steven Thompson, SCFS Chairman, was on hand to thank Sam for his years with SCFS, noting that for Sam it was more than just a job as he has a heart for the seafarers and is always available to them.

He noted that a special debt was owed to Sam as, when SCFS had been going through difficulties some time ago, Sam had brought it to his church. Their timely intervention was instrumental in securing the future of SCFS.

Archie McAvoy represented Sam's home church, Hamilton Road Baptist, sharing how Sam had brought the church onboard with supporting SCFS. He commented that "Sam's Wrap", organised by Sam and his wife Pauline, and run on a Friday evening and Saturday morning at the start of December, had been a highlight for the church for many years. This was a family event with teens and adults making up Christmas gift boxes, while the children made Christmas cards and then eagerly

carried the boxes out to the vans. In recent years the families make up gift bags and drop them into the church, Sam and Pauline



distribute the gifts to the seafarers on the run up to Christmas, and you will also find them visiting ships on Christmas and Boxing Day. Archie talked about the joy it has been to have seafarers visit the church, which has also been able to host some seafarers' baptisms. During COVID Sam found new ways to engage again with seafarers whether through Zoom or by providing daily devotions over YouTube or by engaging in the open air on decks and the guayside. Through the years Sam has also been instrumental in recruiting volunteers from the church to assist in ship visiting, and this summer some folks helped to man the Cruise Ship Hub for the seafarers.

Retired Belfast Harbour Master, Paul Hayes, paid tribute to how Sam comes alongside the harbour staff, and how he











was always quick to raise the needs of the seafarers.

Paul reminisced about Sam's involvement in donating bicycles to assist seafarers travel into Belfast and to local shops. Bicycles were given to vessels which kept them on board and could therefore use them in many ports around the United Kingdom and northern Europe.

He shared about a number of years ago when Sam organised for a group of primary school children to come to Belfast Harbour and sing carols on the quays adjacent to the vessels. This was really appreciated by the homesick vessel crews and was a great way to introduce children to the work of seafarers.

He explained that behind the scenes Sam was often in communication with shipping lines and ship's captains to obtain permissions for visits.

He noted that during the COVID pandemic many seafarers were trapped, with no way of getting vaccines and unable to travel home without them. Sam was able to identify medical personnel and a chemist in North Belfast willing to help, and even transported seafarers to receive the crucial jabs.

Andrew Frizelle, of Frizelle Shipping Services Ltd, shared a message. Extracts:

"A friendly smile and a chat, a visit to town and an internet call home can make a long contract

a bit more bearable. Arriving as strangers, leaving as friends."

"The importance of a ship's visitor is a vital part of port welfare. The personal contact and the chance to offload your concerns to a listening Port Chaplain. The value of just being there and willing to chat and listen, to some crew members can be a life saver. This is the roll filled by Sam Cowan".

"Dull is not a word associated with Sam. He has a broad smile and a cheery attitude to the job. When Sam laughs (which is often) you laugh with him. He climbs the gangway and the crew are waving him to come on board."

Other surprises for the gathered friends, family, supporters and other Port Chaplains and ship visitors included:

- A video greeting from the CEO of the MNWB, who awarded Sam the Lifetime Award earlier this year.
- A video greeting from the Christian Fellowship onboard the Spirit of Discovery.
- Lorraine Foreman shared about her recent cruise ship visiting with Sam.
- Messages from seafarers who Sam has had contact with over the years.

The evening was made complete with a special presentation to Sam, followed by Sam and Pauline cutting the Anniversary cake!

Lydia and I, along with many others, prayed for volunteer support for the Montrose Port Mission. God answered generously with many responding and offering to help. These included small groups such as the Ferryden Craft and Café people who funded the Mission Christmas presents for ship crews.

Given that crew usually only have off duty time in the evenings, we try to ensure they understand that they can use the Seafarers Cabin anytime, without supervision. They are encouraged to make themselves at home, staying out of the weather while enjoying the free Wi-Fi (to phone home), cozy sofas, and a selection of biscuits, chocolates, coffee, and other hot and soft drinks.

Appreciation of our trust is evidenced in the modest use of the free resources and the appreciative entries in the visitors book. (You can read extracts at scfs.org/Montrose.)

We try to provide resources meaningful to tired seafarers' ranging from a guitar with praise and worship song books to radio and CD/DVD players, displays of home languages books, boxes inviting individuals to help themselves to woollen hats, neck warmers and balaclavas, warm clothing to wear under their coveralls, toiletries and suggested presents for the family, soft toys, ladies toiletries and hand bags and children's story book Bibles.


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
